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Measuring Our Progress

Canterbury Golf has three key strategic drivers for 2021-2026 to support the golf clubs in Canterbury and the development and future of the amateur game. The following outcomes have been achieved over the past 12 months. The five year strategic plan was published late 2021.

CLUB SUPPORT

- 6.05% increase in club membership for the year to 30 June 2026.
- Support for clubs with updating their constitutions in line with the new Act - all applicable Canterbury Clubs successfully completing re-registration
- On-going promotion of Canterbury Golf clubs via website and new marketing and communications strategies across all communication channels including projects such as “rounds played each month”, the “Ultimate Golf Raffle”, and our new “Scorecard” EDM.
- Delivery of annual connection events such as Presidents, Secretaries, and Captains Day and Annual Awards Dinner which recognises and celebrates members of the Canterbury Golfing community from all corners of the game including club volunteers, administrators, greens staff and so on.
- Profile & Perception- Golf in Canterbury profile continues to rise with 14% increased reach via Facebook and 16% increased reach via SLG Group

PARTICIPATION

- 637,231 rounds played across Canterbury Clubs for the year to 30 June 2026
- 27.5% increase in Junior Boys membership over the last 12 months.
- 29.5% increase in Junior Girls membership over the last 12 months.
- 39 Futures Hub & Girls Golf coaching programmes delivered over the last 12 months with between 60-90 junior players taking part each term.
- 8 Futures Canterbury Hub events delivered.
- 15 Junior events delivered including Junior Opens, Age Group Championship, and Secondary School Championship
- 16 She Loves Golf events delivered, including new Winter Series of Events

COMPETITION GOLF

- 26 Interclub competitions delivered with 1500+ players involved.
- 28 tournaments delivered with 2140 players involved.
- Canterbury teams competed in 13 representative events within the season across all genders and age groups, with 140 Rep player selections, with our Boys team winning the National title for the first time since 2017, and our Women’s and Men’s Masters team winning their respective South Island tournaments.
- Continuation of CGI Talent Development programme with 25 players involved, attending monthly sessions based on holistic player development.
- Canterbury’s Cooper Moore & Yuki Miya win their first professional tournaments with wins at the Mount Maunganui and Pegasus Charles Tour events respectively.
- Continuation of Development Fund prizes as part of the 25/26 Order of Merit

President’s Report

I am delighted to present the President's Report for the 2025/2026 season—another year of strong growth, sound governance, and continued momentum for Canterbury Golf. Across the past year, the health of golf in our region has continued to strengthen. Participation, competition, and engagement across our member clubs have all trended positively, reflecting the strategic direction we set out to pursue and the collaborative effort of clubs, staff, and volunteers across the district.

Growth & Membership - Canterbury Golf's membership base has continued to grow, building on recent milestones. Our affiliated clubs report sustained interest across both junior and adult participation, and our junior and secondary school pathways in particular continue to go from strength to strength. Canterbury Golf was also selected as the first district in New Zealand to pilot Golf New Zealand's new National Programme Activator initiative—a reflection of our reputation as a district willing to lead on grassroots and pathway development.

Strategic Highlights - This season saw progress on several initiatives set out in our long-term plan: Our Premier Stroke Play Championship returned to its traditional 72-hole format, with increased commercial support and a strengthened field reflecting the calibre of the event. We launched a new major fundraising initiative, the Ultimate Golf Raffle, with proceeds reinvested into junior development, club capability, and pathway delivery. The continued embedding of Golf Genius technology across district fixtures has improved the competition experience for players and spectators alike, supporting our broader digital strategy.

Acknowledgements & Operations Update - An organisation is only as strong as its people, and we are blessed with an extraordinary network of staff, volunteers, convenors, and sponsors. Staff Operations: I would like to extend our immense gratitude to General Manager Blair Minton and the operational team for their relentless drive. We also warmly welcomed our new Marketing & Communications Coordinator, Steph Peploe, whose impact on social reach and storytelling across the district has been immediate. Farewell to Mike Millward: This season marked the retirement of Mike Millward (Golf Operations & Support) after 11 dedicated years of service. Mike's immense operational knowledge, commitment to club draws, and warm presence have left an indelible mark on Canterbury Golf. We thank him sincerely and wish him the very best in his retirement. Volunteers & Committee Members: To our Executive Committee, Sub-Committee Chairs, Club Presidents, Captains, Greenkeeping staff, and selfless volunteers—thank you. Your tireless passion is the heartbeat of Canterbury Golf.

Looking Ahead - As we look toward the 2026/2027 season, Canterbury Golf stands in a position of strength, financial stability, and operational clarity. We will continue to innovate, support our member clubs, and ensure golf remains a welcoming, accessible, and exciting sport for every Cantabrian. Thank you all for your ongoing support and partnership.

General Manager’s Report

The past 12-months has been yet another period of growth and momentum in our game and one that has continued to see Canterbury Golf grow and push ourselves with several new initiatives.

Regional Snapshot

The recent trend of growth in our game has pleasingly continued from recent years as the region again experienced a 6% growth in membership. As of 30 June 2026, we have moved past the 15,500 milestone for the first time. For context of where we now sit against all sports in Canterbury currently for club memberships, we are now ranked second, only behind Football but ahead of all other “traditional” NZ sports. This of course doesn’t account for our “casual” players which when you consider this can safely count as the most played sport in the region. This is highlighted by the growth in rounds played alone, which also rose to over 637K+ rounds, an increase of 5% from the 12 months prior. Again, all of these numbers reflect the great work of clubs alongside the growing interest in the sport which we at Canterbury Golf continue to work hard to promote.

Leadership & Finance

The connection between Canterbury Golf's staff, the Executive Committee, and all the various sub-committees continues to be strong and sets a solid foundation for continued improvement. My thanks again go to Canterbury Golf President Dion Kerr who always backs myself and staff alongside the other Executive members often invaluable contributions. This support, alongside measured ambition, has led to another successful financial YE result (after depreciation) for the organisation, where a breakeven result was achieved. Given the initially budgeted \$11K deficit for the FY, which was largely due to increased ambition and investment towards progress, this reflects a positive result while considered alongside the organisations commitment to pioneer new initiatives.

This approach is consistent for the current Canterbury Golf leadership, with us wanting to continue to improve our operations and delivery and accordingly reinvest in the game's development. The following discusses some of the new initiatives we delivered over the last 12 months.

New Initiatives for 25/26

One of the larger new projects that was taken on during the 25/26 year was the delivery of the Ultimate Golf Raffle. This was a District first project and an extensive piece of work which included securing prizes to the retail value of close to \$100K, applying and securing a licence form the Department of Internal Affairs, a website build to advertise and manage ticket sales, alongside an extensive marketing campaign to sell tickets over a 3-month period – all with the intention of



raising funds to continue our Junior Golf delivery. A lot of learnings were made throughout the process, which wasn't without its challenges. However, in the end a total of 956 tickets were sold with the Live Draw completed as part of the Canterbury Stroke Play prizegiving in early February. In the end a successful campaign which lays the foundations for future repeats if desired.

The next big initiative that we were proud to deliver this season was returning the Canterbury Stroke Play Championship back to a 72-hole event. The event was held at the Clearwater Golf Club over the 31 Jan- 1 Feb weekend and saw the best field of amateur players in recent memory assembled, in both the men's and women's divisions. The caliber of players meant it was a competitive process to make the eventual field and with the additional features we were able to deliver as part of the event it was a special and worthwhile return to the true “Championship format.”

Returning to the community space now, we also continued our investment and implementation of Golf Genius technology to all remaining interclub competitions in 25/26. This resulted in more detailed competition information being made available to all interclub participants across our 26 competitions, which now has over 2100 participants playing each year. This was again a year of learning of how to best implement this system across the vast range of interclub competitions we administer, but the feedback we have received to date speaks of an improved experience for all.

Canterbury Golf Staff

As we continue to commit to providing improvements, we also this year extended our staffing resource to cater to this. At the mid-point of 2025 the new Marketing and Communications role was established and the impacts of this position over the last 12-months I believe are evident in our day-to-day work and how we promote clubs and engage with the community about what's taking place. This has included a revamped bi-monthly newsletter known as the “Scorecard” alongside other marketing campaigns. We have also continued to invest in our Participation team with more hours of delivery resource to allow us to manage the increased demand, especially in young people, of those wanting to play the game. We also had a couple of changes in the Golf Operations space following the retirement of Mike Millward with Tony Mordaunt initially filling the position from late-September to March, before our new Golf Operation employee Rodney Downes moving into the position. Rodney has made a great start in the role and plans to get out to connect with and meet key people within clubs in the near future.

Participation & Talent Development

September saw the conclusion of our Young People in Golf plan which was launched initially at the beginning of 2022. It has been very rewarding to reflect on the progress that has been made in young people's golf participation during this time which saw a 121% increase in junior membership across the region. This represents an increase of nearly 700 junior players across the region, coinciding with larger numbers of junior players participating in junior events and learn and play programmes as part of a structured pathway which takes into account the different abilities and motivations of young people and how they wish to enjoy their golf. At the time of writing junior membership has continued to increase in Canterbury and there are now close to 1700 junior members. With the previous Young People plan concluding, a revamped pathway was introduced taking all the fundamentals of the previous structure combined with some new options and programmes to cater for the new current day context. This resulted in a Development Pathway framework which is designed to assist parents and young people in determining the most appropriate opportunities for them in their junior golf journey.

The popularity and passion interclub competitions has also continued and in all we now deliver 26 different Interclub competitions which cater to all age groups and genders. In terms of events, 28 were organised and delivered by Canterbury Golf over the last 12-months with over 2100 participants involved. This continues to compliment the large amount of club events in the calendar and we are again thankful to all the clubs who work with us to manage the extremely busy District Calendar with much effort still applied to share host venue requirements as best as possible.

Representative Golf & Individual Player Success

As ever the representative space remains an area of pride for our region. In all we again competed in 13 events, with tournaments held across NZ. In the terms of the South Island Interprovincial tournaments, Canterbury managed to claim victories in the Women's and Men's Masters space, and in terms of national honours, our Boys team claimed their NZ Interprovincial title for the first time since 2017. With all team members being products of the Canterbury Golf TDP, this was a nice moment for our pathway investment.

There were also several great individual performances with both Cooper Moore and Yuki Miya claiming their first professional event wins at the Mount Manganui and Pegasus Charles Tour events respectively. Cooper was also selected for the NZ Men's Team to compete for the Eisenhower Trophy at the World Amateur Teams Championship in Singapore while Yuki enjoyed a standout 2026 NZ Open where he finished as the leading Amateur claiming the Bledisloe trophy.

Looking Forward

The process of writing this report gives an opportunity to reflect on some positive progress, however as always, the topic of “what's next?” is ever present. The answer to that question on this occasion is the release of our new Strategic Plan for the 2026 – 2030 period. This is a timely exercise with the current day state of the game very different to when the last Strategic Plan was developed in early-2021. With the game having experienced unprecedented growth during that period, which has benefited and positioned many of our clubs well, we must now turn our attention to how we can not only maintain this, but also the opportunities that exist to capitalise on this position. Our new Strategic Plan is closely aligned to that of the recently released Golf NZ Statement of Strategic Direction which we feel is important, but critically we have designed this additionally to be reflective our priorities for growth here in Canterbury and support for our clubs. I look forward to leading the organisation into the future with this refreshed strategy.

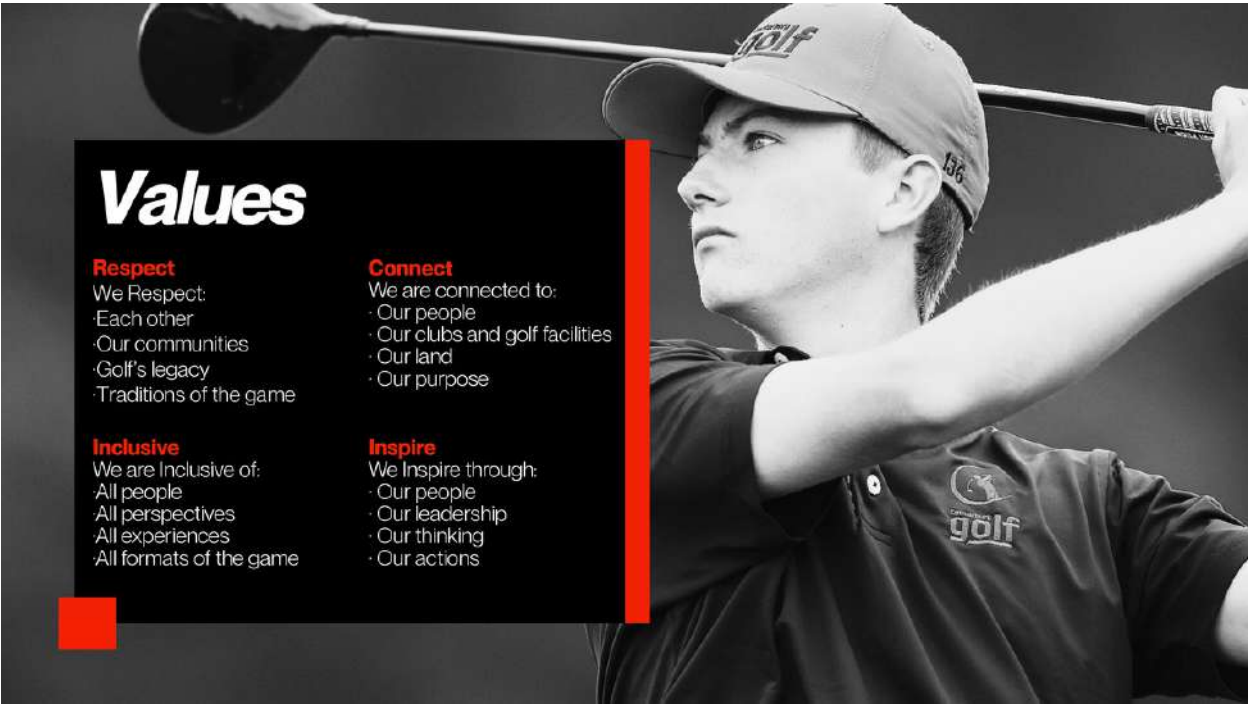

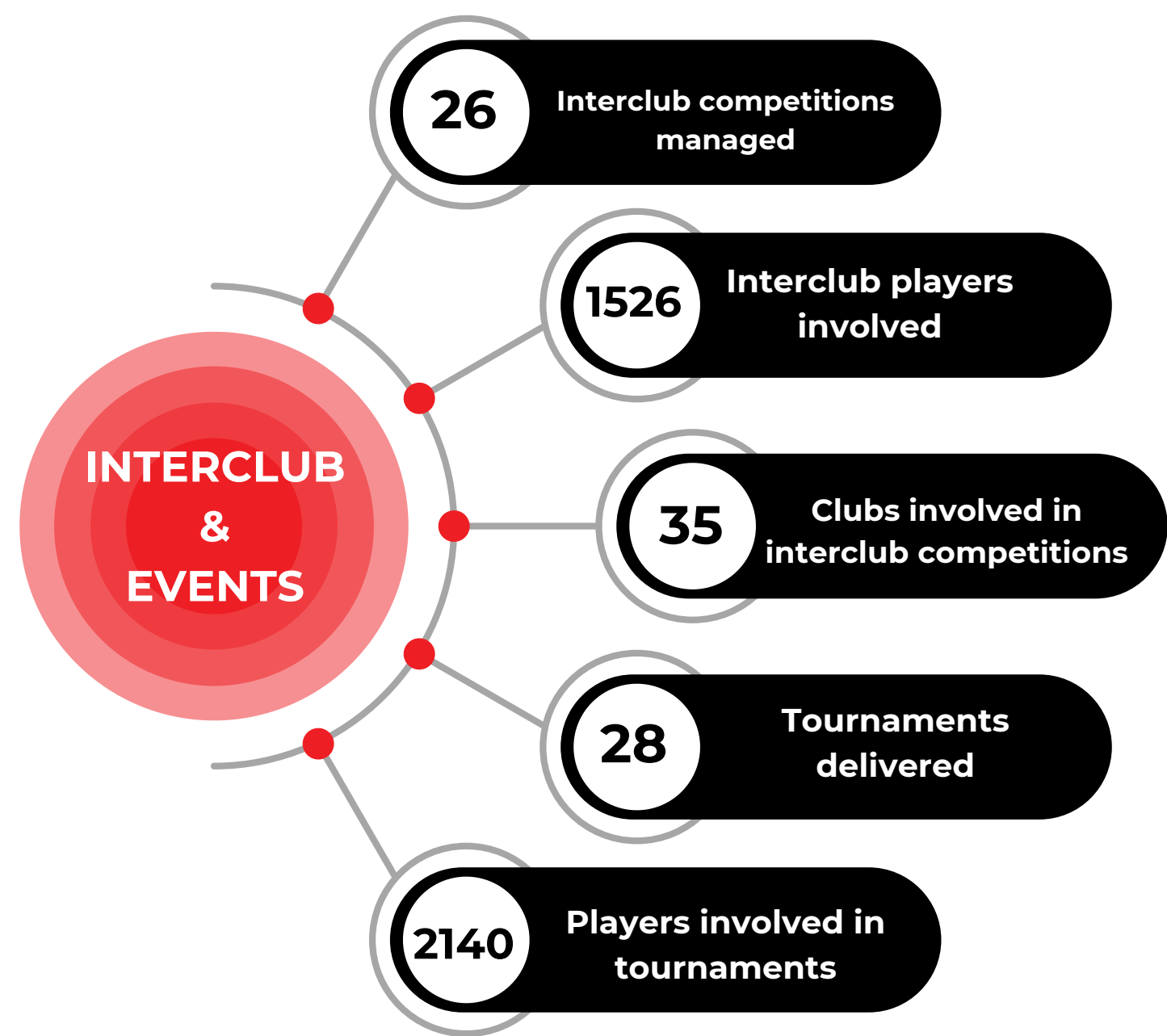

Staff Reports

Golf Operations & Support

This report covers a year of change for golf operations in Canterbury, including my first four months in the role of Golf Operations and Support. I came to the position from a golf background, having played the game for some 30 years before stepping away from it around five years ago, and I have spent much of my time since arriving learning just how much work goes on behind the scenes to keep our competitions running.

I took over from Mike Millward, who held the role for 11 years. Mike leaves behind a well-run programme and a deep institutional knowledge of our clubs, our players and our calendar, and I am grateful for the foundation he has built. Filling those shoes is no small task, but I am passionate about the game and look forward to the challenges ahead.

Across the year we delivered 26 competitions over 226 playing days, spanning men's, women's, 9-hole and junior interclub golf, and together they represent a substantial programme. Building the playing calendar around them remains one of the more demanding parts of the role. With work well under way on the 2027 playing calendar. With so many events to place, fitting everything in requires careful sequencing around public holidays, representative fixtures, New Zealand Golf events, course maintenance windows and the availability of host clubs. It is a genuine challenge each year, and we appreciate the flexibility and goodwill clubs and players show in helping us make the calendar work.

Securing host clubs and venues continues to be an ongoing challenge. Hosting a competition asks a great deal of a club, and we are conscious that the same clubs are often asked year after year. We are grateful to every club that has put its hand up, and we will keep working to spread the load more evenly and to make hosting as straightforward as possible. It's amazing to see, the total number of players taking part across all clubs reached a record high. That result reflects the ongoing appetite for competitive golf in Canterbury and the work our clubs put into encouraging members onto the course.

Over the next 6 to 12 months my priority is to get out and visit clubs across Canterbury. There is no substitute for seeing courses first-hand and hearing directly from committees, managers and members about what is working and where we can do better. Those conversations will shape how we plan the calendar, how we approach hosting arrangements and how we support clubs through the season.

With participation at a record high and a full programme of competitions in place, the year ahead is a good platform to build on. I look forward to meeting many more of you over the coming months, I might even have to clean the clubs and get back out there on course.

Marketing & Communications

This has been a foundation year for marketing and communications at Canterbury Golf. With the role still new and part time, the focus has been on building a consistent base to work from rather than starting every piece of communication from scratch. Clear brand guidelines and templates are now in place for regular comms, and parts of the website have been refreshed to match.

The Scorecard eDM has also moved to a reliable nine-hole structure, giving us a proper home for regular results as well as sponsor and club spotlights, all packaged up in a format that feels distinctly Canterbury Golf. The aim throughout has been to bring more consistency to how Canterbury Golf looks and sounds, so the brand carries its own weight across every channel.

From there, attention turned to sharpening how events are marketed, with a stronger emphasis on sponsor visibility, driving entries, and following up with players once events wrap up. Stroke Play was the clearest example, stepped up and positioned as a premier event with a much stronger social presence before, during and after play, and the feedback from players reflected that, including good numbers travelling in from outside the region. The Ultimate Golf Raffle sat apart from this as a standalone campaign and was a good chance to bring campaign skills to the table, building the full concept and asset suite on a modest budget and moving quickly through a fast-paced content plan to make the most of every opportunity in the lead up.

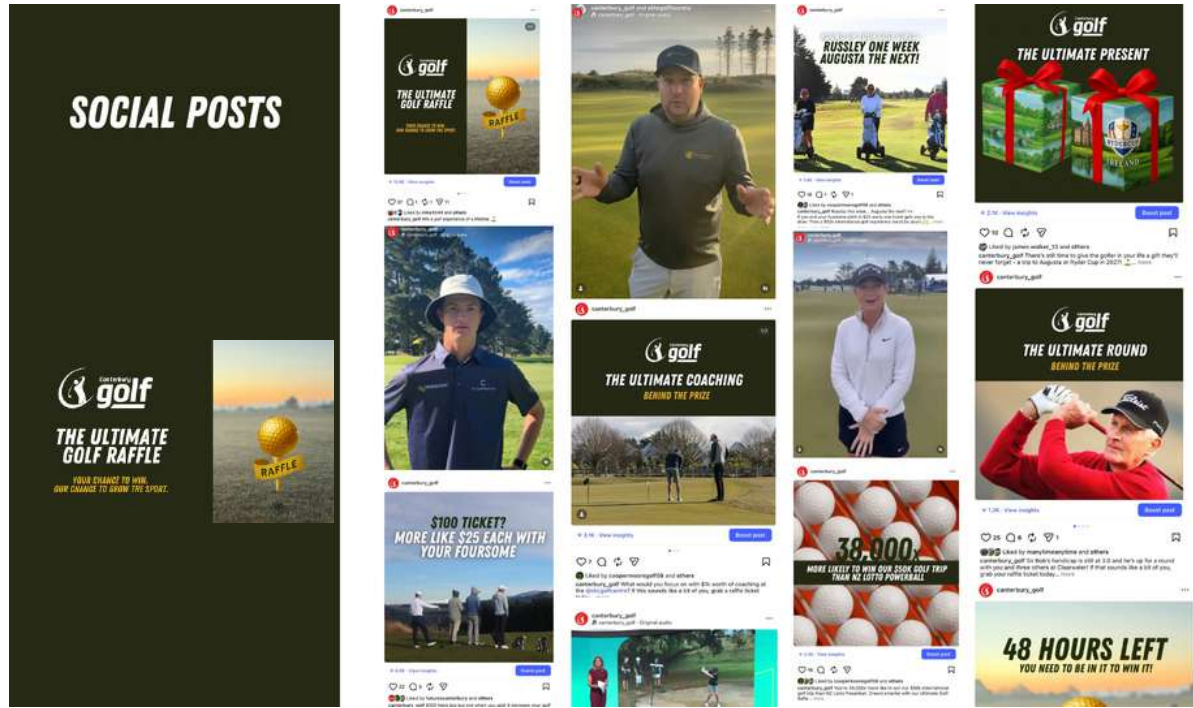
On the She Loves Golf side, the priority heading into winter was keeping the group engaged and growing through what is traditionally a quiet period. Securing new sponsorship to support a fuller winter series helped make that possible, and a wider variety of winter events brought a good number of new women into the series. The SLG Facebook group continues to be one of the most engaged spaces we have for connecting with women wanting to get into golf, and Golf NZ has since shown interest in adopting the SLG Scorecard concept for its own initiatives, a nice sign that the format is working.

All of our channels have grown this year, with social media leading the way, up 14% on our main Facebook page and 16% on the SLG page, driven by more engaging content and a bit of paid support behind it. The goal now is to keep that growth curve up while holding onto the engagement levels.

The main challenge has been capacity within part-time hours. Beyond that, the real opportunity for next year is getting more clubs involved in what we are doing and using comms to open up the why behind our initiatives, so clubs feel closer to them.

I've genuinely enjoyed my first year working in golf, and I'm excited for the work we've got planned to keep promoting a game so loved across Canterbury.

Participation Coordinators

This report covers Canterbury Golf's participation programmes over the past twelve months. These include Golf in Schools, our wider coaching programmes, the Canterbury Secondary Schools Championships, Futures Canterbury, junior competitive golf, the Emerging Players Programme and She Loves Golf. It has been a busy and rewarding year across all of them.

Golf in Schools remained our key entry point for young people into the game this year. We were sad to see Neil Birkett retire this year, after more than a decade delivering this programme across Canterbury. We thank him for helping thousands of kids into the game and wish him all the best for retirement. This year we ran five Golf in Schools programmes across the region now moving into the upcoming year we have refreshed the branding, added more flexibility to how sessions are delivered, all to help the programme grow and we are pleased to have Matt and Catherine leading this space. We also ran several introductory level sessions delivered in support of the Selwyn Sports Trust, Primary School Sports Canterbury and North Canterbury Sports. We also would like to thank the juniors who have stepped up to help us deliver these sessions: Alice Fry, Vanessa Lim, Yuki Miya, Mitchell Redmayne, Ryan Mordaunt and James Mordaunt.

The Canterbury Junior Open series ran across 15 events this year, for 1,109 total entries from 307 individual players. Boys accounted for 947 entries from 258 players and Girls accounted for 162 entries from 49 players, with plenty of room to keep growing this side of the series. The Futures/9 hole Junior Opens ran across 17 events This included 10 Junior Open 9 hole events and 8 Futures events with 119 different players taking part across 280 total entries We are also pleased to welcome James Ferguson Earthmoving, as the new main sponsor of the Canterbury Junior Order of Merit, giving it a profile of its own and letting us reinvest in the players who commit to our events.



Three events stood out as highlights of the year. The Canterbury Secondary Schools Championships ran again this year. The event was held across two venues: McLeans Island for the cup event and Coringa for the championship event. It drew 150 participants from 25 secondary schools, 119 players competed in the championship event on a 20 handicap or better, 31 players competed in the cup event on a 20 or higher handicap. This was a strong and growing result for the event, continuing to demonstrate solid interest in golf at secondary school level. The Canterbury Age Group Championships were hosted at the Russley Golf Club with a field of 82 players, our clearest measure of the strength at the top of the region. The Junior Pro-Am also returned this year at the Templeton Golf Club, where 45 juniors teamed up with 16 professionals in a format we would like to see grow in the coming years.

Futures Canterbury membership now sits at 241, with 157 of those joining for the first time this year across the Selwyn and North-East hubs. We have spent the year refining the hub model, so it keeps working for both members and hub clubs. In September 2025 we introduced a concession card, issued to every new and renewing member. It gives unlimited rounds at their own selected club, plus up to five rounds at each other club in their hub, tracked through a simple hole-punch system. This has strengthened Futures Canterbury's relationship with the Selwyn and North-East hub clubs. Between them, these clubs have introduced hundreds of young people to golf over the years. Futures Canterbury also runs a wider programme of coaching, across the year we delivered 39 coaching programmes in total, engaging 244 children. We thank our coaches for their ongoing support: Matt McDowell, Matt McLean, Zaria Bourne, Catherine Palmer, Andy, Jordan Pruden and Danielle Price.



The Emerging Players Programme launched this year for players sitting just below Talent Development Programme level. Giving players more support across the whole game: such as mental skills work, practicing with purpose and other ways to develop, rather than just playing more events. A highlight of this program was Canterbury versus Aorangi development match at Ellesmere Golf Club, giving 46 players from the two regions a taste of team golf, was one of those sessions. Growing this programme is a focus for the year ahead, to help strength junior golf in the region.

The She Loves Golf series continued to grow strongly this year, giving women across Canterbury a friendly and welcoming way into the game. The series ran 16 events across 11 Canterbury venues, drawing 237 unique participants and 806 total entries. This was an average of 50 women per event, with 60% of participants playing two or more events. Field sizes peaked at 70 at Russley in November. The winter series was a new initiative to carry on momentum between our spring and summer series, to keep the women engaged and to also give some different options, that some ladies may not have experienced before. Such as Golf Warehouse indoor simulators offering coaching and learning about equipment etc. The Clubroom and Full Montys in Rolleston are next on the agenda for another simulator experience. Two new Winter Series events introduced 30 women to the programme for the first time. A new scorecard initiative was also brought in this year which encouraged strong engagement at the events where participants needed to complete each activity/event on the scorecard to then go into a draw to win one of five prize packs. Each prize pack includes goodies from our she loves sponsors Jeuneora and Craigs investment along with She Loves Golf merch. We would also like to thank Vera wine spritz, a company from Marlborough who kept our ladies refreshed and simply nourish for the generous vouchers who looks after Womens health.

Our focus for the year ahead is turning the numbers we reach into players who stay in the game. This means more girls and women playing golf at every level. It also means more juniors coming through the Emerging Players Programme and more school kids finding their way into a club. We intend to take a lead on growing female participation specifically, working with clubs to build something in each, or most, of them, while keeping the wider momentum going.

A big thank you to the clubs who hosted our events and opened their courses to us this year. We also thank our coaches, volunteers, parents and juniors for their commitment throughout the year. None of these results happen without you.

Men's Events

The Men's Events Committee oversees Canterbury-wide interclub competitions — Woodward, Blank, Simon, Thompson MacDonald, Over 50s and Champion of Champions - together with major Canterbury tournaments, including the Canterbury Stroke Play, Match Play and 4BBB Pairs.

The 2025 season was another successful year, with strong participation across all interclub events as more golfers continue to embrace team competition. The interclub finals, held at McLeans Island, produced several outstanding results. Harewood claimed the Woodward Cup in convincing fashion, defeating Clearwater in the semi-final before overcoming Christchurch in the final. This was Harewood's third Woodward Cup title, following previous victories in 1964 and 1988. Defending champions Avondale retained the Blank title with a win over Coringa. Clearwater won the Simon competition, while Christchurch secured the Thompson MacDonald title and earned promotion to the Simon Cup. Thompson MacDonald continues to grow in popularity, with 14 teams entered for 2026, up from 10 teams the previous year.

Our major Canterbury tournaments also continue to attract high-quality fields and remain extremely popular, with some events requiring players to be balloted out. In 2026, the Canterbury Stroke Play returned to a 72-hole format. Ricky Kang claimed the 2026 Stroke Play title at Clearwater, narrowly winning by one shot from Mitchell Kale. Looking ahead, Canterbury Golf is considering the introduction of a Canterbury Masters Stroke Play event in 2027 for golfers aged over 40, reflecting continued growth in playing numbers.

Special thanks go to our Men's Events Committee, Tournament Directors, Interclub Convenors, referees and other volunteers, who generously give their time to ensure the smooth and successful running of our events. Their contribution is greatly appreciated. Sincere thanks are also extended to our clubs for the use of their courses and facilities, and for the high standard of course presentation.

Finally, thank you to the Canterbury Golf staff for their continued support and assistance throughout the year.

Representative

With the commencement of the premier interclub season, the first representative match was the annual Town vs Country game. This always produces some interesting games to aid the selectors and has the only game of matchplay foursomes, which can produce some interesting shots for the players. This was played at Waimak Gorge, and Town were deserved winners in a fixture that many of the season's Men's representatives played in.

This was followed by the annual fixture against Aorangi where Canterbury prevailed. This is an important fixture for both provinces and can be used as a development game and first experience of playing for Canterbury for many players. This match also has an important focus for the Masters, which is very important for Aorangi.

After the Aorangi game, the squads for the Women's and Men's South Island Interprovincials are named, as well as the Boys and Girls National Interprovincial squads.

The Girls Interprovincial team played at Rotorua Golf and finished as very credible runner-ups. A couple of the North Island provinces are always to the forefront in this competition, with many of these players also in their Senior Representative squads.

The Boys team won the competition finishing ahead of Taranaki on a countback of games won. Individually, James Mordaunt was unbeaten and was player of the tournament.

The South Island Interprovincial tournament was held at the Pleasant Point Golf Course, a very underrated course and well worth a visit. The Women's competition only has three provinces playing Otago, Aorangi, and Canterbury. It is hoped that Tasman will be back in future years. The team were too strong for the other two provinces and won this comfortably. The Men had a harder competition with both Tasman and Southland also playing in the competition. Canterbury without both Cooper Moore and Sam McGill were not at full strength, but debuts were given to juniors Ethan Lam and James Mordaunt with the team eventually finishing 3rd. This tournament provided a valuable guide for the selectors' decisions for the National Interprovincial squads.

The Men's Masters team were also top of table in the South Island Interprovincial played at Invercargill Golf Club, the majority of these players were then selected for the National Freyburg at Omaha Beach Golf Club where a test of attrition is played. 8 rounds of matchplay golf over 5 days. The Canterbury team

finished in 6th position with losses to the top two teams, Auckland and Wellington.

The National Provincial championship for Women was played at Ashburton Golf Club in December. A young Canterbury team with several players still at school had a valuable experience and finished 6th, a result that the team will be looking to improve on next year. At the same time, the Men's Interprovincial team played at Manawatu Golf club finishing 3rd. Golf New Zealand changed the format for the 2025 Interprovincial tournaments and removed semi-finals, which combined with one loss in the round robin to Auckland was enough to derail the team's expectations. Golf NZ have since reversed this decision for the 2026 year based on overwhelming feedback from the players against this change.

Into the start of the 2026 calendar year, and the Boy's South Island Interprovincial were played within the South Island Age Group Championships tournament at Methven. An abundance of Under 19 players led to difficult selection choices which is always a good problem to have. A great opening day had Canterbury on top but a huge comeback from Otago saw Canterbury finish second.

The Canterbury Women's Masters Team competed in the National Masters at Taupo and finished 9th in April.

Age Group

The year to 30 June 2026 was another very positive one for junior golf across Canterbury, with sustained membership growth, strong demand for events and clear evidence that the region's development pathway is working. Canterbury Golf remains focused on creating fun, inclusive and progressive opportunities that help young people begin, enjoy and, where they choose, excel in the game.

Futures Canterbury remains central to this approach. Through its North-East and Selwyn hubs, the programme combines accessible club membership with learn-and-play sessions, subsidised programmes, events and opportunities for families to play together. The completion of the 2022-2025 Young People in Golf Plan provided a useful measure of progress with Junior club memberships reaching 1,269 by September 2025, an increase of 121% over four years.

Event participation also reached new levels. The 2026 Canterbury Age Group Championship at Russley attracted a record 82 players, across boys' and girls' under-13, under-16 and under-19 divisions. The Canterbury Secondary Schools Golf Day expanded to two simultaneous events at Coringa and McLeans Island, creating appropriate competition for a wider range of abilities. A record 150 students from 23 schools entered.

The Junior Order of Merit series continued to provide an important bridge between club golf and higher-level competition, as well as providing development funding to support future participation, coaching and competition costs. We also welcomed Ferguson Earthmoving as the new sponsor of the series and its Development Fund prizes.

Our representative and talent development programmes enjoyed an outstanding year. All 25 Talent Development Programme members received access to the Sir Bob Charles Golf Centre to support their training. At the 2025 national age-group interprovincials, the Canterbury boys won the New Zealand title for the first time since 2017, with James Mordaunt unbeaten and named Player of the Tournament. The Canterbury girls finished runners-up, reaching the national final for the third consecutive year, while Vanessa Lim was also unbeaten and received the Player of the Tournament award. These performances provide strong validation of the long-term development pathway.

We also continue to be exceptionally proud of several of our former Canterbury talent development players, who continue to chalk up exceptional achievements at both a New Zealand and global level in amateur golf. Overall, junior golf in Canterbury is in excellent health. The Age Group Committee will continue to work closely with Canterbury Golf, clubs and coaches to maintain a welcoming entry point and meaningful opportunities to progress into interclub, representative and national competition.

Finally, this year marks the retirement of two long-standing Committee members, including me as Chair, after many years of service. It has been a privilege to contribute to junior golf in Canterbury, and I extend my sincere thanks also to Jayden Moore, my fellow retiring member for all his commitment and support. We welcome James Ferguson as the new Chair moving forward and wish him well for the future. I know he will do an outstanding job and continue the growth of junior golf in Canterbury.

Description of Canterbury Golf's Objectives

Based on its 2021-2026 Strategic Plan, Canterbury Golf aims to deliver outcomes based on an Annual Management Plan that provided KPI's toward the achievement of the 2026 strategic goals targeted at club support, participation, and competition golf.

Club Support – supporting clubs to ensure they are sustainable, increasing memberships, and performing well for their members.

Participation – increasing both membership and the number of overall rounds played.

Competition Golf – facilitating and improving competitive golf including high performance programmes, increasing the number of Canterbury players selected for national representation, and a competitive interclub competition.

Achievement of these outcomes enables golf to improve its service and contribution to the well-being of the Canterbury community as a sport, pastime, and recreation.

Description of Canterbury Golf Key Activities for 2025/2026

During the financial year ended 30 June 2026, the Society delivered the following:

Club Support and Sustainability

Canterbury Golf has worked closely with our member clubs to provide administration support and promotion. Particular highlights included support through the requirement of clubs to update their constitutions in line with the new Incorporated Society Act, with all Canterbury member clubs completing this prior to the deadline. Additionally, we have continued to promote clubs through various marketing campaigns including projects such as "rounds played each month", the "Ultimate Golf Raffle" and our new "Scorecard EDM". This was alongside our annual connection events such as our annual Presidents, Secretaries, and Captains Day and our Annual Awards Dinner which recognises and celebrates members of the Canterbury Golfing community from all corners of the game including club volunteers, administrators, greens staff and so on. Near the end of the current financial year Canterbury Golf also begun work on a new 2026 – 2030 Strategic Plan which will be introduced for the next financial year.

Participation

We have continued to deliver the final year of our Canterbury Golf Young People in Golf Development Plan (2022-2025) focussed on improving service to young people, increasing participation, and fostering talented young golfers. Over this time period we were able to report 121% increase in Junior membership. This delivery continued in conjunction with our Futures Canterbury programme delivery for young people and families as well as our Girls Golf and an expanded "She Loves Golf" campaign with additional Winter Series events introduced. We also redeveloped the overall Young People Development Pathway and revamped our Golf in Schools programme options with both now being implemented. A new concession card system was also introduced in the Futures Canterbury programme to improve course usage management for participating clubs, this was launched in September.

Statement of Accounting Policies:

Basis of Preparation

This performance report is prepared in accordance with the XRB's Tier 3 (NFP) Standard. The entity is eligible to apply these requirements as it does not have public accountability and has total annual expenses of less than \$5,000,000. All transactions in the performance report are reported using the accrual basis of accounting. This performance report is prepared under the assumption that the entity will continue to operate for the foreseeable future.

GST

All amounts are recorded on a GST exclusive basis, except for Debtors and Creditors which are stated inclusive of GST

Income Tax

Canterbury Golf Incorporated is wholly exempt from New Zealand income tax having fully complied with all statutory conditions for these exemptions (CW 46 – for promotion of amateur sport).

Bank Accounts and Cash

Cash and short term deposits in the Statement of Cash Flows comprise cash balances and bank balances (including short term deposits) with original maturities of 90 days or less.

Revenue

Grants and Donations

Minor donations are treated as income on receipt. Significant donations and grants with documented expectations are treated as liabilities until the funds are spent as intended. Once the expectations have been met the Grants are transferred to income.

Levies

Club levies are invoiced based on the calendar year, unpaid invoices are recognised in accounts receivable. At 30 June 2026 50% of the annual levies are recognised as income in advance.

Fixed Assets

Fixed Assets are recorded at cost or revaluation less accumulated depreciation.

Revaluation of Assets – Land & Buildings

Land and buildings were last revalued based on the Christchurch City Council Valuation Notice of 1 August 2025. Council rateable values may not reflect current market values.

Depreciation

Depreciation has been calculated using rates applicable to write assets off over their expected useful lives.

Reserves

The asset revaluation reserve represents cumulative revaluation gains recognised on land and buildings. Land and buildings are measured using Christchurch City Council rateable values. The reserve is an accounting reserve and does not represent cash available for general operating expenditure.

These financial statements should be read in conjunction with the notes and accompanying auditor's report.



Investments

Investments are term deposits which are initially recognised at the amount invested. Interest income is recognised on an accrual basis and any interest not yet received is added to the investment amount.

Liabilities

Liabilities are stated at the estimated amounts payable and include obligations which can be reliably estimated.

Assets Held on Behalf

No funds were held on behalf of the South Island Golf Association or any other third parties as at 30 June 2026.

Commitments

As at 30 June 2026, the entity maintained two vehicle lease agreements with VFL Securities Flexi Lease as follows:

- One vehicle leased on 25 September 2024 for a 45-month term, expiring 25 June 2028.
Current lease commitment - \$10,564 GST exclusive (2025: \$12,500)
Non-current lease commitment - \$10,564 GST exclusive (2025: \$21,129)
- Another vehicle is leased on a month-to-month basis and is expected to be replaced in August 2026. As at 30 June 2026, no lease agreement for the replacement vehicle had been finalised and therefore no commitment has been included.

A Copier lease was signed in July 2025 for a five year term with monthly payments.

- Current lease commitment - \$1,850 GST exclusive
- Non-current lease commitment - \$5,705 GST exclusive

Income in Advance – Deferred Revenue

At balance date membership levies of \$196,641 (2025: \$184,184) were invoiced which related to the 2026/27 financial year. These have been carried forward to the next financial year.

Contingent Assets and Liabilities

There were no contingent assets or liabilities as at 30 June 2026 (2025: Nil).
